Lift the tongue tip up behind the top front teeth, onto the little bump (the alveolar ridge). Build up air, then release it in a quick tap. No voice.

Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Toy garage and cars

Drive toy cars up a ramp and down again. Make them crash gently, get stuck, and need a tow.

Words that come up: toy, car, top, go, stop, stuck, out, wait, fast, hit, tow, turn, down, up, tires

Tea party

Pour pretend tea for stuffed animals. Let one spill and need a towel. Narrate as you pour and offer seconds - "more tea", "too hot", "thank you".

Words that come up: tea, teapot, cup, pour, hot, taste, towel, more, thank you, wait, sit, out, that, drink

Tickle and stop

A simple turn-taking game. Tickle for two seconds, then stop and say the word yourself - "more", "again" - before starting again. Any signal counts, a look or a reach included.

Words that come up: tickle, stop, more, toes, tummy, wait, again, my turn, not yet, that, hot, cut it out

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

Two truths and a tale

Say three things about your week; the listener guesses which one is made up. "Truth," "tale," and "tell" are all targets, and so is most of the storytelling.

Time travel

Where would you go and what would you take? The past, the future, tomorrow and next time all carry /t/.

Category tennis

Bat a category back and forth - types of transport, things in a toolbox, sports teams - until someone runs out.
