Press the tongue tip up behind the top front teeth, keep the sides of the tongue down so the voice flows around them, and hum. The mouth stays open.

PRACTICE TIP

Gliding ("wion" for "lion") is the most common /l/ error. Have the child bite gently on their tongue tip and then hum - the sound that comes out is very close to /l/.

Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Look and find

A picture book or an I-spy game. "Look" is the highest-value /l/ word a toddler has.

Words that come up: look, little, light, love, lion, leg, lap, ball, doll, all, fall, tall, pull, bell

Lights on, lights off

Flip a light switch, use a lamp, use a torch. Narrate every flip.

Words that come up: light, lamp, look, on, off, little, dark, all, pull, fall, tall, ball, help, well

Lining things up

Line up cars, animals or blocks in a long row. Count the line, then knock it down.

Words that come up: line, long, little, look, last, line up, all, ball, tall, fall, pull, roll, well, hill

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

Lists of favorites

Make a top-ten list out loud. "List," "like," "love" and "last" all repeat.

Lately

Talk about what you have been up to lately. "Lately," "little," "lot" and "like" carry it.

Would you believe

Tell a tall tale. "Believe," "little," "almost" and "actually" are all loaded with /l/.
