

Vocalic R Word List

Vocalic R is what happens when R swallows the vowel in front of it. The tongue makes the same bunched or retroflex shape as consonant R, but it holds - there is no vowel afterward to glide into. Each r-controlled vowel starts from a slightly different jaw and lip position, which is why a child can nail "car" and still miss "chair."

PRACTICE TIP

Always probe all six r-vowels before you pick a target. Most kids have one or two that are already close to correct - start there, get a stable production, then generalize outward to the others.

/r/ errors are among the most common reasons school-age children are seen for speech sounds. Work one r-family at a time rather than "R" as a whole.

Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Farm and barn play

Set up a barn with animals. AR words dominate: barn, farm, car, yard.

Words that come up: barn, farm, car, yard, star, arm, dark, park, more, door, corn, horse, bear, chair

Parking lot

Park toy cars in numbered spaces. Drive them far, near and around.

Words that come up: car, park, far, are, star, door, more, four, corner, garage, over, under, here, there

Teddy bear picnic

A picnic with bears on a chair. AIR words come free.

Words that come up: bear, chair, share, care, hair, there, where, pear, stairs, more, four, teddy bear, over, here

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

Compare and contrast

Compare two things in detail. Comparatives all end in -er: bigger, smaller, harder, faster.

Where were you

Talk about where you were and what you were doing. "Where," "were," "there" and "here" are among the highest-frequency vocalic R words in English.

Career day

Describe jobs and what each worker does. Teacher, doctor, farmer, firefighter, engineer - job names are an -er goldmine.
