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Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Go-and-stop games

Red light green light, or a toy car that only moves when someone says "go." Take turns being the one who says it, and model "go" clearly on your turns.

Words that come up: go, go go go, again, get it, give me, gone, grab, big, dig, wagon, ready, my go, let go

Garden digging

Plant seeds in a pot, real or pretend. Dig, water and check on them. Bury toy bugs to find later.

Words that come up: garden, dig, grow, green, grass, bug, wagon, gate, ground, water, big, again, give, gone

Hungry monster

A puppet or a paper-bag monster that gobbles food with a loud "guh-guh-guh." Feed it and let it ask for more.

Words that come up: gobble, go, get, give, more, gone, hungry, big, yuck, grapes, egg, bag, again, good

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

Guess the game

Describe a board game, video game or sport without naming it. "Game," "guess" and "goal" repeat the whole time.

Good, better, best

Rank three things and justify the order. "Good," "great" and "gets" carry the conversation.

Grocery run

Plan a shopping list for a meal, aisle by aisle. Groceries, grapes, green beans, garlic, gravy - the aisle list is a word list.
