Hum the back of the tongue up to the soft palate like /g/, then hum through the nose without releasing. The tongue never comes down.

PRACTICE TIP

Watch for kids who say "ringing" as "rinning" - that is fronting. Cue the sound at the back: "make it in your throat, not on your teeth."

/ŋg/ never begins an English word, so this page has medial and final lists only.

Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Ring and sing

Sing songs with actions and ring a bell between verses. Any -ing word is a target, so narrate everything in the present progressive.

Words that come up: ring, sing, song, swing, bang, hang, running, jumping, singing, playing, going, long, king, thing

Swing and slide

At a playground or with toys. Narrate constantly: "You are swinging! He is climbing!"

Words that come up: swing, swinging, sliding, climbing, running, jumping, going, playing, hanging, long, strong, wing, thing, bring

Banging instruments

Drums, pots, a toy xylophone. Bang, ring, ding - the sound effects are targets on their own.

Words that come up: bang, banging, ring, ding, gong, song, sing, singing, long, strong, playing, loud, again, thing

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

What are you doing?

Describe an activity entirely in -ing verbs. Every verb is a target.

Strongest and longest

Compare things using superlatives. "Long," "strong," "young" and "among" all carry the sound.

Something, anything, nothing

Answer questions using only those three words plus detail. All three end in /ng/.
