Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Ball play

Roll, bounce and throw a ball back and forth. Name what you are doing every time - "my turn", "big bounce", "roll it back". Keep the ball moving: the repetition is what does the work.

Words that come up: ball, bounce, big, my ball, bye ball, back, boom, bump, grab, throw, roll, again, baby, bubble

Baby doll bath

Wash a doll in a tub of water. Name each body part as you scrub, then wrap the baby in a blanket for bed.

Words that come up: baby, bath, tub, bubble, back, belly, bib, blanket, bed, rub, bye bye, brush, bottle, towel

Box surprise

Hide small toys in a box or bag. Shake it, guess what is inside, then open it together. Refill it and do it again.

Words that come up: box, bag, book, bear, bug, ball, boat, bird, open, inside, look, what is it, big, grab

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

Best and worst

Take turns naming the best and worst version of a category - best breakfast, worst chore, best birthday. "Best" and "birthday" are the freebies.

Would you rather

Would you rather be a bird or a bug? Ride a bike or a boat? Every prompt can be built from /b/ words, and answering brings them back through the pair.

Book talk

Describe a book or a movie without naming it. Character, beginning, problem, ending - the retell vocabulary carries plenty of /b/.
