PRACTICE TIP

Fog up a mirror or a window. That warm breath IS /h/ - then add a vowel right behind it: h-h-hat.

High-frequency initial words

High-frequency medial words

Everyday words rather than picture-card words - which is why most lists leave them out. A child already says these hundreds of times a day, so they carry more carryover value than any noun above. Target them in conversation, not in drill.

Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Hide and seek

Hide a toy and give hot-or-cold hints. Let them hide it for you too.

Words that come up: hide, hot, here, help, house, hand, hat, who, how, hooray, behind, hiding, have, hey

Hat shop

Try on every hat in the house, including improvised ones. Look in a mirror and react to each.

Words that come up: hat, head, hair, help, how, hot, here, have, hold, happy, hi, hello, ha ha, huge

Hopping game

Hop like a rabbit, a frog, a kangaroo. Hop to things you name, then hop back.

Words that come up: hop, high, here, hurry, hold, hand, help, hooray, hot, happy, home, how many, hang on

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

How do you

Explain how to do something ordinary in exact steps. "How" starts every round, and instructions are full of /h/.

Hypotheticals

What would happen if...? Every question starts with a /h/ word and the answers usually contain more.

Headline news

Turn the day into news headlines. "Here," "happened" and "headline" are constants.
