Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

No and yes game

Ask silly questions they will want to reject. "Is this a banana?" while holding a shoe. The "no" comes out with feeling.

Words that come up: no, nope, not, nine, new, nose, name, one, in, on, down, again, done, run

Nose and body parts

Point to noses, knees and chins on people, dolls and animals. Get it wrong on purpose.

Words that come up: nose, knee, chin, name, no, one, nine, ten, in, on, down, hand, run, again

Night night routine

Put toys to bed one at a time, tucking each one in and turning off the light.

Words that come up: night night, no, nap, name, nine, ten, down, in, on, done, again, moon, sun, one

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

Name that thing

Describe something without naming it. "Name," "never," "nothing" and numbers all appear.

Never have I ever

A clean version: never have I ever eaten... "Never" every single round.

Number news

Talk about a day using only numbers - how many hours, how many minutes. Numbers are dense in /n/.
