

R Sound Word List

There are two good ways to make /r/. Bunched R: hump the back of the tongue up toward the roof of the mouth and pull the sides tight against the back teeth. Retroflex R: curl the tongue tip up and back without touching anything. Either one works - pick whichever the child stumbles into first.

Voiced Alveolar/palatal liquid

PRACTICE TIP

The tongue tip must NOT touch the roof of the mouth, and a little lip rounding is fine and normal - do not fight it. Cue "pull your tongue back and make your cheeks tight."

Word-final R is really vocalic R (the /er/ and /ar/ family). The final list below is a starting point - see the Vocalic R page for the full set organized by r-controlled vowel.

High-frequency initial words

High-frequency medial words

Everyday words rather than picture-card words - which is why most lists leave them out. A child already says these hundreds of times a day, so they carry more carryover value than any noun above. Target them in conversation, not in drill.

Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Rocket launch

Count down and launch a toy rocket, a paper plane or a balloon. Say the countdown together - joining in is easier than starting.

Words that come up: rocket, ready, run, red, up, go, round, roar, right, rise, again, rush, race, wrong

Racing cars

Race cars down a ramp. Announce the racers, call the winner, run it again.

Words that come up: race, racing, ready, run, red, roll, round, rush, right, wrong, again, ramp, road, rear

Roaring animals

Lions, bears and dinosaurs that roar. The roar itself is a sustained /r/, which is a useful warm-up.

Words that come up: roar, run, red, rabbit, rhino, right, round, rough, really, run away, ready, rock, roll, rest

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

Rank and rate

Rate things out of ten and justify. "Rate," "rank," "really" and "right" repeat constantly.

Rules of the game

Explain the rules of a sport or board game. "Rules," "right," "run" and "round" are unavoidable.

Right or wrong

Debate whether something was the right call. Both key words are /r/.
