High-frequency final words

Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Shopping trip

Set up a pretend shop with a basket and play money. Take turns being the shopkeeper, so you model the asking on your turns too.

Words that come up: shop, shoe, shirt, sugar, shelf, cash, push, show me, wash, dish, fish, brush, shut, shell

Washing station

Wash toy dishes or toy cars in soapy water. Scrub, rinse and dry each one.

Words that come up: wash, dish, splash, shine, brush, shake, finish, shirt, push, shh, fresh, rush, shower, shampoo

Sleeping animals

Put stuffed animals to bed and shush them. Anyone who wakes up gets shushed again.

Words that come up: shh, sleep, shush, quiet, wake, shut, sheep, shoulder, shake, fish, wish, brush, blanket, shadow

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

Show and tell

Describe something you own and why it matters. "Show" and "share" anchor it.

Shopping spree

Spend an imaginary hundred dollars, item by item, and justify each purchase.

Should or should not

Debate school or house rules. "Should," "shouldn't" and "sure" repeat constantly.
