

W Sound Word List

Round the lips into a tight little circle, pull the back of the tongue up and back, then glide straight into the vowel. /w/ is a movement, not a hold.

PRACTICE TIP

Exaggerate the lip round - "make a fish face, then say oo-oo-water."

/w/ is a glide and never ends an English word, so this page has initial and medial lists only. Remember that "two" and "sword" have no /w/ sound.

High-frequency medial words

Generalization

Word lists get a sound into a child's mouth. Generalization is what gets it into their life. These are activities where the target words come up on their own, so nobody has to be talked into practicing.

Play-based ideas for young children

Water play

Pour, splash and scoop water between containers. Ask "what" and "where" constantly.

Words that come up: water, wet, what, where, wow, we, want, wash, one, why, wait, away, work, walk

Wagon rides

Pull toys in a wagon around the room, stopping to load and unload.

Words that come up: wagon, want, we, walk, wait, wheel, way, where, what, one, whee, again, go, win

Wind-up toys

Wind up a toy and let it go. Say "wind it up" each time you do it, so the words are there to borrow.

Words that come up: wind up, want, wow, watch, wait, where, what, we, why, one, again, go, whee, win

Conversation and verbal games for older kids

Who what where

Play a question game where every question starts with a WH word. Most of them are /w/.

Would you rather

The word "would" starts every round, and "want" appears in every answer.

Weekend recap

Talk about the weekend. "Weekend," "we," "went," "was" and "watched" carry the whole thing.
